The archive documents the impressive diversity of local initiatives in Detroit, for example social initiatives, cultural projects, organizations of small businesses, musical networks, early retirement associations, neighborhood initiatives, construction coops, and others.

The "Tree of Heaven" or more colloquial "Ghettopalm" is a weed tree commonly found on abandoned lots or former factory sites. It could be seen as an indicator of decay and neglect. Instead the Detroit Tree of Heaven Woodshop, founded in 2005 proposes to make use of this unique resource to develop specific products in cooperation with local specialist, institutions and initiatives. For the newly opened MOCAD the proposal is a museum bench.
